FOLLOWING 20 YEAR SERVICE

The arrival of Principal Neil Brooks in June 1995, welcomed an eager and enthusiastic Deputy-Principal from Auckland's Eastern suburbs. Taking on the lead role at Piopio Primary School some twenty years ago was a direction he and his family fondly remember. Whilst initially rural life was a shock, both Neil, his wife and young son soon appreciated the community atmosphere and overwhelming support into the district. With the support of staff and other community groups, both Neil and his wife felt comfort in their surroundings. For his wife, she found friends and a social network through Playcentre, which was a great grounding for a new family to the community.

During his 20 year term, much has changed in the education system and Neil recalls his first leadership test in 1996, the concept of composite classes. A challenging time and questionable decision, this approach to class rolls was keenly debated but is now common practise in many rural schools. His time as Principal showed his passion for the learning of children and this was evident as he recognised the changing role of education within his school. Collectively he and the Board of Trustees throughout the years built on the foundations of traditional school values to enable children to become life - long learners. With this changing emphasis learners needed to know how to learn; the process now was

becoming more important than the product. Children were not only finders of knowledge, but sorters and analysts of it, makers of it, users of it, all in ways that were related to the values that the community and country ascribed to. The skills of being able to question and to think, to use wisely and competently the ever changing technological resources became an integral part of the curriculum.

With his drive to engage children and to strive to extend each to their fullest potential, he regularly joined in school events in his own charismatic nature, dressing up and supporting his school house group with such vibrancy. This approach was also obvious with his active role in many fundraisers and support in ensuring the children within his school could access the extra resources.

As the school year draws to a close, so does the tenure of Neil's term as Principal. After 20 years at the helm, 2015 will be his last in charge. It is rare in this day and age to see such a lengthy service to a single entity. "There has never been a day when I did not want to come to school". True words spoken from a leader passionate about our youth. This is a testament to his professionalism and dedication that he has championed the cause of this community's children for so long.

The school and community will be celebrating with Neil and his family at a special function on Friday 11th December at 5pm. Everyone is welcome to thank Neil for his commitment to our children and our community.

When the horse shoes had nearly been cooked in the fire the blacksmith would pick it up with a long metal bar. Then he would hold it and bang in the holes.

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EARNING IN THE FIELD

Agriculture at **Piopio College on** Fridays is embracing Piopio College's vision statement

and strategic goal that:- "We will work collaboratively to create a dynamic learning environment which is the focus and pride of our community. Our stimulating curriculum will allow students to choose their pathways and will provide them with the necessary skills and knowledge to empower them to become successful, responsible citizens. Piopio College will become a school with choice and a school of choice."

"That student's enjoy an innovative curriculum that is responsive to their needs"

In 2015 over twenty five students from Year 9 to 12 have elected to be part of this course. The programme includes DAT's deliberate acts of teaching in the classroom, farm placements, short agricultural industry visits, speakers, and practical skills tuition. A set of workbooks have been developed to consolidate the skills and information being taught and to strengthen literacy skills particularly at Year 9.

Most recently we have had Tertiary Providers, Land Based Training from Whanganui deliver an Agriculture Taster Day on the school grounds. The programme involved:-

- Site induction and Health & Safety discussion
- Quad Bike pre-start check, basic riding progressing to "slalem" highlighting safe riding under very close supervision
- Multi activities Electric fence set-up/Nail in a block/Drench qun
- 40 Question Quiz
- Fun activities with a serious message eg staying focused

Following on from the Taster Course day, tutor Mr Peter in-depth course on the Safe operation of a Quad and Riding a guad on flat terrain under close supervision. For the practical component King Country Honda kindly loaned and delivered an appropriate guad for the course. This was very much appreciated and perfect for the purpose.

WAITOMO DISTRICT ANIMAL CONTROL

Do not leave your dog in a hot car. On a hot day, the temperature inside your car can reach 39 degrees in 10 minutes. In 30 minutes, even in the shade with the windows down, the temperature can rise to a deadly 49degrees. A dog's natural cooling process is ineffective in these conditions and can result in heatstroke.

Symptoms of heatstroke are:

- Heavy panting
- Profuse salivation
- Extremely red gums and tongue
- Lack of co-ordination
- Vomiting/diarrhoea
- Loss of consciousness

Provide first aid to dogs suffering from heatstroke by cooling with water that is not ice-cold.

• Wet the skin thoroughly, not just the coat. Focus on the belly and inside of the legs

 Spray or sponge the dog until their body temperature is lowered

• When the dog is cooling

 Seek veterinary attention as soon as possible If you find a dog locked in a car in distress, please call the Police on 111 or your local SPCA immediately.

Are you expecting visitors over the Christmas holidays?

Noise, confusion and changes in routine are stressful for dogs. Even a normally calm pet may become agitated enough to bite under the extreme circumstances.

• Always remember to supervise your dog around children. Children are the most likely victims of dog bites.

• When visiting a house with a dog, children should be taught not to approach the dog (even if the dog has been friendly on other occasions). Children need to ask for permission from the dog's owner, then gently pet the dog's chin, chest or shoulders.

 If you have multiple dogs, consider kennelling them, crating them or keeping them in another room during large gatherings.

DOG CONTROL

We urge dog owners to make sure their dogs are kept secure on their property to avoid having their dog impounded. There effort made to use less are many ways you can do this; with adequate fencing, a kennel or a running wire. The fence must be of adequate height because some breeds of dog can jump a lot higher than you would expect. Check your perimeter fence regularly for holes, gaps or obstacles like a compost bin or wood pile, that the dog can climb on to jump over the fence. Keep in mind that a dog barking from boredom or seeking attention can create a nuisance to neighbours so it is important to make time to exercise your dog. Food, exercise and shelter are basic essentials you must provide as a responsible dog owner.

If your dog is impounded by Animal Control (for the first offence), it will cost you \$60.00, plus \$10.00 per day for food. These costs will need to be paid in full before your dog is released from the pound.

If your dog is not registered, you will also be required to pay for your registration before your dog is released from the pound. So be your dog's best friend and keep him or her secure on your

property.

WATER CONSERVATION

WDC are promoting water conservation efforts over the summer months. Every water inside and outside the home will make a big difference.

Tips for using less water over the summer holidays

• Remind visitors and guests that water supplies are limited.

- Promote shorter showers and shallower baths.
- Do full loads in the clothes washer and dishwasher.
- Use a bucket when washing boats, trailers, jet skis, kayaks, etc.

• A swimming pool cover can cut evaporation by as much as 90%, reducing the need for top ups in the hot summer season.

 Use a broom to sweep sidewalks and paved areas. Using a hose for this can waste as much as 1,000 litres of water per hour.

• Wash your car on the lawn.

Tips for efficient garden watering

• Water sparingly - every four or five days - to encourage roots to grow deeper.

 Water in the early morning or evening to reduce evaporation.

 Apply a thin layer of mulch to your plants – this helps to retain moisture

 Check taps, pipes, and connections regularly for possible leaks.

Christmas Recipe -**Raspberry and White** Chocolate Baked Cheesecake

This recipes is one I stumbled on in the Dish Magazine, this cheesecake is so delicious and really easy to make. Your family will be impressed if you whip this up for Christmas day! You can use fresh or frozen raspberries, making it the perfect year round dessert.

Ingredients

250g plain biscuits (I use wine biscuits) 60g butter, melted 150g white chocolate. chopped into small chunks 600g cream cheese at room temperature 200g mascarpone 150g caster sugar 2 Tbsp custard powder 1 Tbsp vanilla extract 1 Tbsp water 2 eggs 2 egg yolks 200g fresh or defrosted raspberries

Method

Line the base of a 23cm removable base cake tin with baking paper, and lightly grease or spray the sides.

Preheat the oven to 160°C. Whizz the biscuits and melted butter together in a food processor until they resemble fine breadcrumbs then pour into the tin and squash down first with your fingers, then smooth out with the back of a spoon. I like to go a little bit up the sides just to give the cheesecake extra support. Put the base in the fridge while you make the filling.

Melt the white chocolate either in a heat proof bowl over a saucepan of gently



boiling water (don't let the base of the bowl touch the water) or in bursts in the microwave (about 20 seconds each time).



Whisk until smooth. Whizz the cream cheese, mascarpone and sugar together in a food processor (just give the food processor bowl a quick rinse after making the base) until smooth.

Mix the custard powder with the vanilla and water and add to the filling with the eggs and extra yolks. With the motor running add the white chocolate in a couple of lots and whizz until well incorporated. Pour the filling on top of the base.

If your raspberries are frozen, drain them in a sieve, and if they are fresh, give them a gentle mash with a fork until a little squishy. Plop on top of the filling in little blobs. Cook for 70 minutes, then turn off the heat and allow to cool in the oven with the door open just a crack - wedge something small in the door so its stays just a tiny bit open.

If your oven runs a little hot, reduce the cooking temperature to 150°C during cooking. Once cool keep in the fridge, and just remember to remove it half an hour before serving. Enjoy!
