Protection of staff No1 for local organisations

TE KUITI Police support Te Kuiti Work and Income New Zealand's decision to double security and adopt zero tolerance to abusive behaviour.

The stance follows the recent fatal shootings at Ashburton (*Waitomo News*, September 9).

"We totally support this," says Te Kuiti Police Sergeant Craig Lindstrom.

"Police have had to deal with a number of unacceptable and intolerable matters at the Taupiri St Work and Income offices over the years.

"There haven't been any recent events. However, police are certainly backing WINZ in the current situation."

REGULAR PATROLS

Mr Lindstrom says police have an ongoing relationship with WINZ and Community Link, and there is a regular police presence within the building.

"I have spoken with manager Simon Hepi since the Ashburton event and we're making regular patrols through the complex," he says.

"It is a terrible situation for those staff. They do accept that, in their line of work, they have come across people with frustrations, but they should not have to bear the brunt of those frustrations."

NO TOLERANCE

Waitomo mayor Brian Hanna says he will not tolerate abusive behaviour towards frontline staff at the Waitomo District Council offices, or at any other council facility.

"When Minister of Social Development Paula Bennett spoke at Hangatiki recently she said very strongly WINZ staff have probably tolerated a lot more poor behaviour from clients than they should have," says Mr Hanna.

"We do get the odd abusive person at the Te Kuiti counter, and our girls handle them very well, but it's not something we want."

He will also deal directly with any complainants. "I normally say to staff if they get someone who's got a real problem to put them through to me and I'll deal with it."

Mr Hanna says council's frontline staff are there

to do a job and are not responsible for council's decisions.

"Abusive language or behaviour is not a common occurrence and I won't have our staff who are there to help ratepayers, treated in that manner.

"It's something we don't tolerate and we can take quick action if needed."

At the same time he backs the ability of council's frontline staff to handle the "prickliest" of people with diplomacy and customer surveys show they do a "fantastic job".

"We don't turn anyone away, but we make sure they are respectful in their enquiries."

TRAINED

Otorohanga mayor Max Baxter says all council front counter and service staff have had training in dealing with unpleasant situations and abusive behaviour.

Staff have the option of taking a customer aside to discuss their issue and the front counter is under video surveillance in case a situation gets out of hand.

"The layout of our offices means the front counter is within hearing range of all our management offices," says Mr Baxter.

"The chief executive's door is usually open so he is constantly aware of what's going on in reception.

"If anyone did raise their voice, you can be assured half a dozen managers would be there very quickly. And the building department guys are also very handy, so there's a fair amount of backup if something got out of hand."

Mr Baxter says over the years there have been a couple of instances where a ratepayer has been asked to calm down, but no-one has ever been ejected from the building.

"The shootings in Ashburton were horrendous. The WINZ ladies [who were killed] were just doing their job and certainly no-one deserves what happened to them."

Mr Baxter says the safety of ODC staff is paramount.

"They're just like your family, in many respects. You've got to look after them and protect them."

IN BRIEF

<u>Temporary helipad</u>

NORTH King Country patients needing treatment at Waikato Hospital will now be flown by the Westpac Rescue Helicopter from a temporary landing site at Te Kuiti Aerodrome.

Te Kuiti Hospital's helipad has been closed while the medical centre undergoes an \$830,000 makeover to meet earthquake standards, which began September 5. (Waitomo News, September 2)

Before the six-month project started, Civil Aviation Authority and Waikato District Health Board representatives approved an interim helipad at the airfield that sits alongside SH3.

<u>SH1 delays</u>

NORTH King Country residents heading south of Cambridge on SH1 can expect minor delays. About 12,000 cubic metres of sand must be moved from the west side of SH1 across to the east side, as work on the Cambridge section of the Waikato Expressway continues. Work started yesterday and should be complete within a month, weather permitting.
