Golden times on their way

DESTINATION Waitomo co-chairman Nick Andreef is predicting a "golden period" of business for North King Country tourism operators following a surge in visitor numbers to the region.

In a report released yesterday, Hamilton and Waikato Tourism's (HWT) statistics show for the year ending June 2014 commercial guest nights in the Waikato region were up 9.3% compared to 5.4% nationally and guest arrivals were up 13.3% compared to the previous 12 months.

Domestic nights also increased, rising 10.6% across the year.

SEVEN COUNCILS

HWT is a Regional Tourism Organisation (RTO) funded through a Service Level Agreement from the region's seven local authorities - Hamilton City, Waikato, Matamata-Piako, Waipa, Otorohanga, Waitomo and South Waikato district councils.

Mr Andreef, who is also the founder of Waitomo Adventures, credits the increase to a recovery from the 2007/2008 global financial crisis, HWT advertising and interest in the region following the release of *The Lord of the Rings* and *The Hobbit* movies.

Destination Waitomo Inc administers the official travel and tourism website for the Waitomo and Otorohanga districts by offering information about tourist attractions, accommodation options, restaurant ideas and adventure activities from Kawhia to Mokau.

MORE TOURISTS

"Every month since April, visitor numbers at Waitomo Adventures have been up on the same time last year," says Mr Andreef.

"That growth has varied anywhere between eight to 40 percent per month and it only seems to be getting stronger. But we're not the only ones. Many other business operators I speak with are recording very strong numbers as well.

"I think it is because the world is getting over the global recession, and various

markets are recovering. "But also because the 100% Middle Earth campaign is working, especially on Americans, by making Waikato and the North King Country a must stop destination on their itinerary."

EMPLOYMENT

Figures released last week by the Tourism Industry Association of New Zealand (TIA) showed 11.4% of jobs held by Otorohanga residents are supported by tourism with 9.3% in Waitomo.

For the entire Waikato the figure is 16.6% (or one in six) placing the region among one of the most reliant on tourism employment in the country.

Mr Andreef says the increase in tourist numbers is not just financially beneficial to local business operators but it provides employment and business opportunities as well

"We (Waitomo Adventures) are employing new guides as fast as we can and we'll be hard put to have enough guides for summer.

"The flow-on benefits from that are all these people will live and work in the area and spend their pay here.

"So all the signs are that the next two or three years are going to be a little golden period for tourism in the North King Country."

He says The Timber Trail in Pureora and Hairy Feet Waitomo in Piopio have only added to the district's appeal and together with HWT, everything is being done to capitalise on increasing visitor numbers.

"The RTO message that this region is a one stop destination for all tourists has been going out internationally for about three years now and if we can all keep singing the same song from the councils down to the individual operators then I'm sure the local tourism industry will only continue to grow.

"And so far it is working great."
