WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE MUSEUM?

April 2018 - This month Easter weekend has been even busier because of the Bone carving and the pop up shop.

The Easter bone carving workshop went extremely well, with 23 carvers coming from all over the North Island. Expert carver Owen Mapp from Paraparaumu led the workshop and displayed some of the finest bone carvings in the country. The combination of museum, hall, bone carving and pop-up market created a great vibe in the village. Thank you to all those people who donated food, goods and services to these events. The resulting community spirit is exactly what Waitomo District Council is hoping for by funding events such as this.

AGM: It is that time of the year again. Our AGM will be held on the 16th May at 4pm at the Museum. Generally known as "WW1 Silks". They were first produced in 1914 through to 1918 The WW1 cards were hand embroidered onto strips of silk mesh. Embroidered by French and Belgian women refugees who worked in their homes and in refugee camps. The embroidered strips were sent to a factories mounting onto a postcards. The WW1 Silks were wildly popular with servicemen on duty in France. The postcard that the Museum has is an embroidered ribbon with the words "From a friend". The UK flag on one side, the other side, flag of France. Sprigs of leaves and flowers are on either side of the ribbon.

Tainui Historical Society

The Chapmans of Rerekapa, Tongaporutu & Mt Messenger

(An abridged version of Phil Beard's Story)

On September 12th 1896 a 603 acre block of land in Rerekapa was proclaimed as "Greenlands Improved Farm Settlement". Six sections were allotted, five of 100 acres and one 103 acre, being Sections 2,3,4,5,6, & 8, Blk 13 Mimi S.D.

John James Chapman of the Wairarapa applied for and was granted a section 8. Mr & Mrs Chapman and their family of 10 aged from a baby to 15 yrs shifted to Urenui. From there J.J.C. and the oldest boys walked to the Rerekapa to start felling the bush. They walked from Urenui to Pukearuhe, along the coast to Tongaporutu, up the River and through a pass in the Mt. Messenger Range, carrying all their needs on their backs for a very Spartan existence. At what stage the rest of the family went in to live is unclear – in fact it could be that the family did not come to Urenui straight away, as the youngest child was born in Woodville on 24.2.1897 and was subsequently drowned at Rerekapa on 1.6.1898. Hers was one of the first burials at the Tongaporutu Cemetery (outside the present confines of the Cemetery).

In the first season 20 acres of bush was felled and 23 the next. The residence was started in 1898. On 6.3.1898 J.J.C. applied to exchange his allotment for Sec 8 Blk 4 Mimi SD at Tongaporutu. He being very fortunate to be granted this together with Sec 7 - 195 acres in all, which he took up on 2.1.1901. It would appear that most of the original Greenlands Settlers bailed out, leaving the Hutchins families with a viable amount of land.

On 1.1.1900, my father J.J.C. Jnr (then aged 18 yrs) in partnership with his brother Charles had also taken up Sec.9 Blk 13 of 250 acres of land in the Rerekapa. It has been suggested that the original purpose for the opening of this land was that it was on one of the possible railway routes. Ownership of this section passed to Henry (Harry) Jury on 8.9.1908.

Many years of hard labour went into the Tongaporutu farm, a lot of which was heavy swamp solid with fallen timber from bygone ages. Drains were blasted but the falling water table only brought more timber to the surface. When Maurice Collins, a returned soldier, took over in 1948 it was finally tamed. **Cont. on pg 5**

The timber had rotted somewhat and tractors came on the scene. The road frontage flats were good and in my time one paddock was used for football matches.

Two more children were born to the family at Tongaporutu. The first children were destined to work very hard but as time went by and finances improved the younger ones had more chances. Jean and Mabel became nurses and Edith would have been a good one. Henry was killed in WW1. Ada, Winifred and Philip became school teachers, Ada having taught at the Okau school, riding there from the farm each day on an ex racehorse which she owned. Winifred (dux NPGHS in 1914) taught at Awakino finishing there in 1921. Philip progressed to be a secondary teacher. J.J.C. Snr farmed the land, plus some Education Board land until he retired in 1920 when my father, J.J.C. Jnr took over. He had spent some of his life post Rerekapa working for surveyors, one of whom was a Mr Skiltrop. One of the jobs was the Waikawau Road. After that he worked for the N.P. Borough Council, renting a house where his sisters Ada and Winifred stayed with him while continuing their education. When he married in 1914 he went to the Kaponga area where my mother's family were from. My mother's grandmother had built the Kaponga Maternity and Surgival Hospital. It was there that their first son Bill was born. The first child born after the shift to Tongaporutu lived only 3 months and never came home. Three more were born while at Tongaporutu - Alf 1919, Phyllis 1924 and Hazel 1932. By 1936 the depression years had taken a toll on my father's health. The two sons had left home, the youngest, Alf, to get out of the mud at Tongaporutu. MUD was the abiding theme and memory of Tongaporutu to all who lived there in the early days. When Dad walked off the farm there was still another Chapman to take over the farm. Jean had married Otto McGregor and they farmed up the Okau. They leased the Tongaporutu farm and employed labour for it. All Chapman connection ceased when Maurice Collins bought it in 1948.

Ngā Hapū o Poutama...Pānui

Tēnā ra koutou katoa.

We have been wintering down the bees and doing AFB (American Foul Brood) checks. It is illegal to keep or ignore AFB contaminated hives. Hives with AFB must be destroyed within 7 days of discovery, usually by burning the whole hive with the bee colony inside.

Seems harsh but the whole industry would collapse if these methods were ignored hence the penalties involved. AFB spores can survive outside a honey bee colony for more than 35 years, and are able to withstand very high temperatures, including boiling water. **Continued...** The spores are also resistant to a range of disinfectants.

A honey bee larva is usually infected by being fed AFB spores which contaminate the brood food placed in its cell by nurse bees. The larva eats the spores, which then germinate in the larval gut, and turn into the vegetative form of the bacterium.

The vegetative form is in the shape of rods. These rods penetrate the gut wall of the larva, where they multiply, consuming the larval tissues. Death of the developing bee usually occurs either in the pre-pupal stage or just after pupation. When the vegetative rods have consumed all of the larval tissues, they turn into spores again. A single diseased larva may contain more than 2.5 billion spores. House bees in the colony try to remove diseased larvae and pupae and in so doing become contaminated with spores. New larvae are infected when they are fed contaminated food.

Spores are the only form of the disease that can infect healthy larvae. As well, the spores can only increase in number by infecting a larva. They do not multiply in any other environment (e.g. honey or beekeeping equipment). AFB spores will only multiply inside a larva. It's important to destroy the contents of diseased hives and to sterilise thoroughly any remaining hive equipment, by approved methods.

New Plymouth District Council have placed the NZTA Notice of Requirement on hold pending further information for the Mt Messenger Bypass Project. NPDC are looking at hearing commencement, Monday 11 June, 2018 NPDC have said a decision will be made later in the year.

Ngapera O'Sullivan helped team leader Stella McQueen and other ecological scientists from Kessels Ecology, carry out a fish depletion survey and stream diversion at the Awakino quarry recently. Everything went smoothly with over 1300 fish relocated. Fulton Hogan along with the ecologists have expressed their thanks and appreciation to Ngapera for her help and enthusiasm.

Ngapera enjoyed working with the team involved and was impressed at the meticulous skill throughout the project including the professionalism of the digger excavation work in the stream by Mark Vicker. Thanks to Phill Houben and the team at Fulton Hogan Ltd for ensuring that the environment within the stream has been protected for the many fish species living within it.




