

The Aria Toy Library has seen a lot of new members join in the last year and three new comittee members appointed at the AGM held in March.

Thank you to everyone who supported our photo fundraiser with Charlotte Purdie. We raised over \$2000, which all went towards new toys for our Tamariki at the Toy Library!

We would also like to thank the Piopio Aria Mokau Co-operating Parish and the Mustard Seed Opportunity Shop for their kind donation, along with The Lines Company and our generous landlord – it is all greatly appreciated.

Some of the new toys purchased include Magentix sets, a Pikler triangle and ramp, a 3-wheeled scooter, a Tee-Pee tent, new cosy coupes, and a trailer. So come in and try them out!

Thanks must also go to COGS and the Lotteries Commission for the yearly grants given which are essential to help cover our operating costs.

To join it costs \$60 per year and there are no additional charges to hire each toy, like some other toy libraries. You can keep each toy for four weeks.

We also have special fees for grandparents, so come and see us to find out more!

Opening hours are 10:30-12:30 on a Thursday and you will find us on the main street in Piopio. We are always welcoming new committee members if you would like to be a part of a group of young ladies.

#### Freshwater Farm Plans (FW FP)

Changes are coming ...The National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management NPS-FM is currently being reviewed. The Government has announced it intends to improve the freshwater farm plan system to make the system more cost effective and practical for councils and farmers. The changes are intended to enable farmers and growers to find the right solutions for their farm and catchment, and

**WORMWISE**, Drench Resistance and Prevention Strategies to make sure the time and cost of completing a farm plan event was held May 16 at Rotomate; a knowledge filled af-matches the level of risk.

Work is underway to integrate existing farm environment or industry assurance plans into the freshwater farm plan system, as well as the certification and auditing requirements of the system. In the areas where the freshwater farm plan rollout has started, the Government may look at whether current requirements to complete a freshwater farm plan within 18 months, could be paused while improvements are developed.





# Reflections on early years in Piopio

#### by Jean Toms

I WAS BORN Margaret Jean Sinclair in Piopio at the nursing home on November 25, 1929. Nurse Rule was the midwife and the Home was where the Curious Keas pre-school is now, on Kea Street.

I attended the Piopio Consolidated Primary and Secondary School for most of my education. It was an experimental school in those days.

In the Piopio township there was a dairy factory, doctor, two grocery stores, butcher, bakery, post office, three churches, bank, blacksmith shop, draper, picture theatre, and several garages. My father, John Sinclair and Jim Smythe opened the first garage, Sinclair and Smythe, later Piopio Motors, now King Country Honda.

very first bus as by that time there were too many children. The early bus was used as a spare on our run. Here are some of my memories; probably not as exciting as you may think:

- Although we lived only about 3kms from the school I was the first on in the morning and last off at night as the bus went right around the loop. This was so the Brickland boys had time to finish milking the cows before the bus in the morning and get home in the afternoon for the evening milking. It was a long day for a five year old as I also had to walk 1.5 kms each way.
- The road was all metal so the trip was very slow.
- I remember the horn on the

bus. It looked like a balloon and had to be squeezed to make

- On our bus route there were a lot of small farms mostly milking cows and running sheep and pigs. The bus was very full by the end of the run.
- Mary Coyle, now aged 98 rode on our bus. She is related to Mrs Coyle's husband. The Coyles lived on a dairy farm on Kahuwera Road where the Browns are now.
  - Instead of glass windows we had 'roll up' canvas blinds.
- The bus driver would wait for kids if they were late. He knew they would have been busy working in the mornings.

• As soon as I was old enough I rode my pony to school. During the day it stayed in the horse paddock just behind where the swimming pools are now. If it needed shoeing I could ride to the blacksmiths shop in Piopio and after school my pony would be waiting for me in the yard at the blacksmiths.

I have a few other memories of those early school years you may find interesting:

- Arriving at school we were greeted with a lot of noise from Piopio; a hive of activity. There was always the clatter of the cream cans and machinery at the dairy factory and also Mr Glasgow at the blacksmith shop shaping metal using the anvil.
  - Where the college is now was a dairy farm.
- Our house had no kitchen sink and the toilet was outside I started school in 1935 so I did not travel regularly on the at the bottom of the garden. It was scary going to the toilet

after dark.

- Our bath was a wooden tub beside the copper which heated the water for laundry and the bath.
- I remember sad times when children died from childhood illnesses such as diphtheria. There were no vaccinations in those days. We also had a five month break from school in the early 1940's due to an outbreak of polio, a nasty virus that often left people paralysed for
- The small swimming pool at the school now was built before I left school. Before that we swam in the river.

#### A little older family history

My mother, then Beatrice Keith, came to Piopio from Auckland in 1911, that's about 113 years ago,

to work for family friends, the Hattaways at the boarding house. The boarding house was a two storey wooden building right on the main street where the Village Green is now. The boarding house was where several single men lived, and my mother was employed as a housekeeper and cook.

Transport in 1911 to Te Kuiti was by horse-drawn coach owned by Mr Stagg who had stables at the north end of Piopio. The trip was slow and in winter it was boggy. When the wagon became stuck the passengers used to have to push.

# Getting serious about wool

THE government's Woolshed Roadshow, which visited Taranaki and King Country last month at the start of a nationwide tour, is not just a well-defined and meticulously planned initiative but a beacon of hope for our economy.

It represents our best chance to restore wool as a significant export earner and contributor to New Zealand's Gross National Product, paving the way for a brighter future.

The government has invested heavily in the Roadshow, a three-month-long tour that covers the entire country, including key wool production areas, both big and small, from Northland

to Southland. The participation of all three senior agriculture ministers, Todd McClay, Hoggard, and Mark Patterson, underscores the importance of this program.

The ministers' unwavering commitment to engaging with the grassroots, actively listening to their concerns, and discussing practical solutions, is a testament to the government's dedication to addressing the issues of sheep farmers and the agricultural sector.

Todd McClay said the [wool] sector makes a critically important contribution to the fabric of our rural and re-

gional communities.

"New Zealand's food and fibre sector is the backbone of our economy, contributing over 80 per cent of our goods exports. A robust and thriving agricultural sector is vital to the New Zealand economy."

As the minister responsible for wool, Mark Patterson is working with farmers to rebuild a more robust and resilient wool industry. "It has been a challenging period for farmers, so we will interact with people from Northland to Southland, meeting in woolsheds to discuss grassroots solutions."

Minister Hoggard said that addressing unworkable and overly prescriptive regulations will enable farmers to focus on being the most efficient food and fibre producers globally.

The good news for these ministers and our country is that wool is an incredibly resilient and agile industry. Despite economic and market pressures and fragmentation, our farmers and manufacturers retain the core ability, critical mass, and technical skill to take wool in new directions and open untapped markets. The Woolshed Roadshow is the first step on the road to making it happen.


When young squire Watt Cobblers is expelled from Knight School, he reluctantly becomes Merlin's new apprentice.

# **Kerbside Collection Date Changes**

Waitomo District Changing Kerbside Collection Schedule

The Waitomo district is changing its kerbside collection schedule to improve service quality and processing efficiency.

Commencing from Monday, 1 July 2024, a revised timetable will be implemented. This will affect a substantial number of households across Te Kūiti, Piopio, Mōkau, Awakino, and Waitomo Village, with adjustments to the day of the week their recycling and blue refuse bags are collected.

Waitomo District Council General Manager Infrastructure Services, Shyamal Ram, says modifying our waste collection routes is essential for improving the service we provide to our community.

"These changes not only address the needs of our current customers but also ensure the

efficiency and reliability of our kerbside service demands in the district."



We were lucky to have a Volunteer Coach and an Assistant in the pool with each group to give extra support to the swimmers.

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# Looking back at Waimiha

An excerpt from a returned Gallipoli soldier's story of balloted land and the struggles of two pioneering farm families, published in The Waimiha News / Source: www.soldiersclaim.co.nz

THE YEAR is 1920. The Peterson and McNeights were looking towards a new future having suffered the losses of the First World War.

Many families throughout New Zealand had suffered the loss of loved ones as a consequence of Gallipoli and the European conflicts during the Great War. So it was for Hugh and Fanny Mc-Neight whose only son William George had lost his life (1/10/1918) in France. This left only their remaining daughter, Marjorie.
