WDC processes get the big tick

WAITOMO District Council's building consent services are among the best in the Waikato.

A recent International Accreditation New Zealand (IANZ) assessment of the services found 'no corrective actions' were required making Waitomo the second council in the Waikato Building Consent Group to achieve the outstanding re-accreditation result with Matamata-Piako in 2013.

Waitomo is one of seven councils in the collaborative cluster along with Matamata-Piako, Hauraki, Otorohanga, Waikato, Waipa and Hamilton City.

The mandatory IANZ assessment is required for all councils that provide building consent services.

Carried out every two years, the stringent assessments cover every aspect of the building consent process.
