Railway buildings revamp progressing

historic railway buildings is gathering steam.

The Railway Buildings Revitalisation Project has received a \$600,000 Lottery Heritage Fund grant to begin works on the exterior of the Rora St buildings to restore them to their "former glory".

The project, spearheaded by the Waitomo District Council, is expected to take 2-5 years to complete, and has been divided into five projects.

With the roading renewal project (Rora St roadworks) almost finished, the \$700,000 building restoration renewal phase is about to begin.

The other three projects involve developing a plaza area and upgrading the interior of the three railway buildings.

The entire project is expected to cost \$1.5-2 million with the majority of the money coming from external funding.

CENTRAL HUB

THE re-development of Te Kuiti's case the railway heritage of Te Kuiti while creating a vibrant central hub for the community.

> "When complete we also expect to contribute to the economic and social development of the Waitomo district by having commercial stores operating out of the buildings," he says.

> "While this may appear to be a straight forward process, there are many complex steps involved including development of the design concept, seeking community input, obtaining external funding, tendering and contracting, and seeking tenants for the buildings.

> "With the road renewal almost complete and the external works about to begin we are now looking into what can be done internally."

> Mr Hanna says there are several options including a conference room, public meeting facilities, cafe, a museum and commercial spaces.

> "While the external work is being done I will meet with the (Railway Buildings Revitalisation Project) advisory group to get their thoughts on what the internals of the buildings

will look like. The vision is to restore the buildings close to what they looked like during their heyday while establishing retail businesses as well to draw people in.

"We want to create a buzz and an atmosphere within the town by building a central hub that

everyone in the district can utilise. It's coming along well."

He says although passenger trains no longer stop in Te Kuiti, KiwiRail officials have expressed their interest in keeping the Te Kuiti platform operational with the possibility of future use.
