parks are breaking a local authority bylaw and Waitomo District Council is taking steps to enforce the rules.

The Public Places Bylaw states: No person shall permit any stock to be on a reserve, beach or any other designated area without the prior approval of an authorised officer.

'Any person being the owner of, or having control of, any horse in a public place in the urban area shall immediately remove any faeces deposited by that horse from the public place.'

There are also general clauses in the bylaw covering damage to public places.

EDUCATION FIRST OPTION

WDC's regulatory services manager John Moran says the council is aware horse riders have been increasingly seen on park and reserve land and animal control Rod McLeod officer is on the alert for them.

PEOPLE riding horses on public riders, explain the law to them and make sure they understand why they must stay out of the parks.

> "If they continue to ignore the law after that, we will take action.

"We don't want horses in the parks, partly because of the potential damage to the turf, but also because these are recreational spaces for families and children to enjoy and horses could be a danger to those people."

Anyone convicted of breaking the bylaw is liable for a fine of up to

Mr McLeod has also asked Te Kuiti Police for their co-operation to get riders off footpaths.

"Riders need to follow the road code just like other traffic," he says.

There are no public areas in Te Kuiti where horses can be ridden, however, the Horse and Sport Club facilities and track beside Te Kuiti Aerodrome is available to members who pay a \$30 annual fee.

Safety rules for horse riders

RIDERS must obey the following rules in the official New Zealand Road Code:

- Always wear a safety hat while riding.
- Ride your horse on the left-hand side of the road and as far to the left as possible.
- Keep your horse on the side of the road whenever you can, but don't ride on footpaths, lawns or gardens.
- Don't ride more than two abreast.
- Don't ride on the right of any moving
- If you're leading another animal while riding, always keep it on your left, away from traffic.
