The trust, which oversees the Te Kuiti Family Health Centre, celebrated the milestone last month, with Mrs Turia describing it as "an excellent example of an organisation".

The trust has been operating since 1989 delivering a range of services with a focus on the holistic development

and wellbeing of whanau, hapu and iwi including an early childhood centre, smoking cessation, aged care and mental health.

The 25th anniversary was celebrated at the trust's open day in Taumarunui on February 14, featuring speeches from senior Maori business consultant Richard Batley and Ruapehu mayor Don Cameron.

Mrs Turia says the health clinic has always had the people's interests at the forefront of its services.

"Their philosophy to improve the wellbeing of whanau underpins everything they do," she says.

"They have consistently empowered their people through an approach that allows them to have their own aspirations, to take control of their own lives and make decisions on their own health and wellbeing which also recognises who they are and where they have come from."

### Water levels low, fire bans applied

WAITOMO District Council's water alert level is now at Level 1.

This means that residents need to conserve water and avoid watering gardens during the

Residents are advised by council staff that the ideal time to water gardens is 6am-8am and 6pm-8pm to avoid evaporation; to use water saving attachments on hoses and not leave hoses running unattended.

People are also being asked to avoid washing paths and driveways, re-filling swimming poolss, to use a pool cover when not in use, and conserve water when brushing teeth and shaving.

"The weather forecast is dry with no substantial rainfall expected therefore residents need to be vigilant in saving water," says WDC water services manager Andreas Senger.

"Every little bit helps to ensure there will be enough water available for everyone."

### **OTOROHANGA**

Otorohanga residents are also being asked to restrict their water use.

Late last week district council staff, also struggling to meet demand in the dry weather, delivered fliers to residents asking them to voluntarily restrict water use in order to avoid enforced restriction.

"We are delighted to report residents have responded extremely quickly to that request and at this point we have avoided a serious water shortage," says chief executive Dave Clibbery.

"We ask residents to continue their water conservation efforts, by not using garden sprinklers or refilling swimming pools."

People should also turn off taps whenever possible, fix leaks, have quicker showers, use the washing machine less often and delay washing their house or cars.

#### **FIRE BAN**

Total fire bans were put in place in both Waitomo and Otorohanga districts on Friday.

Waitomo's ban extends through until April 30, while Otorohanga's is in place until further
