Ngā Hapū o Poutama

February 2019 Pānui

Tēnā ra koutou katoa,

Everything has a purpose in life. Except wasps. They have no real use and are a big problem this year. They rob, steal and attack. Wasps can sting multiple times and not die. The honey bee which has a very important and significant purpose in life, will die after 1 sting. If you are stung by a wasp you are a marked man. The pheromone contained within the sting of a wasp acts like a beacon for the rest of the 'gang' to smell, and the chase will be on. If you are aware of wasps' nests in the ground, one of the best ways to deal with them is by putting diesel in a bottle (wine bottles are best), stuff the neck of the bottle with a rag, place the bottle upside down and as far into the entrance of the nest as possible and let the very slow seeping fumes kill them. Don't waste your time trying to burn them, they will take off quickly (after chasing you), but the slow release of fumes will be far more effective. Evening is the safest time to kill them.

As you all know, the Mt Messenger Bypass hearings are over, and the Commissioner has given the Mt Messenger Realignment Project the thumbs up. The decision is being appealed by different groups for various reasons. Mrs Pascoe has whakapapa to Poutama through Hera Stockman and the iwi will be supporting the Pascoes in their appeal application to the Environment Court.

Te Oro Day this year is February 16th at Waiopapa Marae. Shared kai and korero. Guest speaker this year is Whetu Fala. Whetu has produced and directed Kotahi Mano Kaika and Te Upoko o te Ika Making Waves. Her work has screened in NZ cinemas, on NZ Television channels One, 2, TV3, Discovery Channel, SBS Australia, Can West Canada, Sweden and Maori Television.

As previously mentioned, an excerpt from the Bruce Stirling 'Nga Hapu o Poutama Customary Interests' historical report will be added to the panui each month. We will use the paragraph numbering Mr Stirling uses in his report. Feel free to email if you are interested in having a digital copy of the report emailed to you;

164. This central aspect of the claim was undone by evidence from the prominent inland Ngati Maniapoto leader Rewi Maniapoto, who had been closely involved in the arrangements with Ngati Tama. He testified that the arrangement with Ngati Tama was conditional, requiring them to align with Kingitanga, live for a time among Kingitanga near Te Kuiti, and ensure the land was not leased or sold. Only after this commitment to Kingitanga had been maintained for some years would they be permitted back on Poutama, and even then, the Poutama hapu would need to consent. As Rewi explained, "I had no authority to give back Poutama" without the agreement of the hapu with

the authority over the land, and he acknowledged they had never agreed: "Poutama was never given back." 1 Hone Pumipi of Poutama also emphasised that he "did not consent" and had objected to the Kingitanga proposal for Ngati Tama to return: "None of us approved of the land being given away."

'Waiho ma te tangata e mihi, kia tau ai.'

For the third time in as many years the Tainui Club will be competing in the top four play-offs for the Taranaki Senior Division Three rugby competition.

On Saturday the team travel down to Waitara for a tough clash with Tikorangi/Clifton to see which of the two teams will meet Spotswood United in the final the following weekend.

It is little coincidence that the run of success by Tainui coincides with the appointment of Stuart Hunter as the coach of the side.

"For a little country team I suppose our results are pretty good, Mr Hunter said.

Training is always a problem for the Tainui team as the players are drawn from as far south as Waitara while to the north there are members from the Te Kuiti and Marakopa areas.

Modestly Hunter takes none of the credit for the proud record of the Tainui team and says that the success is due to a total squad effort in which there are few individual stars. The age span of the team is quite extensive as there are teenage members of the side rubbing shoulders with men who are reluctant to announce how many years past 50 they have advanced.

"Our most satisfying result of the season was last weekend when we beat Coastal by 41-18 to qualify for the top four."

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE MUSEUM

MUSEUM VISITATION: The annual Christmas/New Year holiday season saw an influx of visitors to the Mokau region, and a significant increase in the volume of traffic on SH3 each day, much of it comprising of NZ holidaymakers. The museum was busy over this period with a good mix of local holiday makers as well as overseas visitors who were passing through, in addition to those 'Kiwis' who were enroute to their favourite holiday spot elsewhere. The general feedback from visitors was very positive with many expressing their surprise at the large number of exhibits on display and the comprehensive amount of information relating to the history of the Tainui region.

FIRST GAS DISPLAY: First Gas owns and operates more than 2500kms of high pressure gas transmission pipelines and stations that supply natural gas from Taranaki to industrial consumers throughout the North Island. The Maui pipeline runs 299km from the Oaonui Production Station to the Huntly Power Station.

Beginning transmission in 1979, the Maui Pipeline carried 18Pj of gas from the Maui field in its first year of operation, and by 2015 it carried 143Pj of gas from seven production stations that are directly connected. First Gas will shortly set up a display in the Mokau Museum which will depict the story of the development and construction of this pipeline which crosses the Mokau River nearby.

RECENT HIGH TEA AT MOKAU MUSEUM: The High Tea held at the Museum on Sunday, 20 January was very successful requiring two sittings. It was a good opportunity for local people to catch up and to meet others who were in the district, as well as a few passers-by who dropped in for the 'free' afternoon tea. Our thanks go to Janice Moynihan [aka Mrs Sheen of the Mokau Tearooms] and her helpers for the wonderful afternoon tea.

A big 'thank you' also goes to Val Johns for her help in tidying up the garden in front of the museum.

NEW MUSEUM VOLUNTEER: The Museum Committee are delighted to welcome Jennifer Topliss as the latest museum volunteer.

We are always keen to hear from anyone who would be interested in becoming involved with the Museum, and who wants to learn about the local history of the area and interact with visitors who pass through Mokau. Visitors to the Museum comprise of an interesting cross section of both local New Zealanders as well as International Visitors from a diverse range of countries and cultures.

MOKAU ART GALLERY: The current exhibition "Crows can Count" by Antonia O'Mahony will be on display until 14 February.

The next exhibition which will start from 15 February and run through until 21 March, is by Eltham Photographer, Mark Bellringer. Mark's work will be recognisable to the locals who come to view his show entitled "North Coast" as it explores the coastline and inlets of North Taranaki. Tongaporutu especially, is featured as Mark has stayed there on many occasions enjoying the fishing and exploring. Mark uses the camera to document the landscape and the world around him, and he has the ability to capture the moment 'that is', and which will 'never be again'. Mark works as a full time commercial photographer and videographer and previously spent 15 years teaching in the Art Department at the Western Institute of Technology, WITT. He also takes Photography Tours to India.

From your Police Constable

Hi, Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! The Christmas and New Year's break was a relatively peaceful time with only a handful of incidents.

A large number of drivers were tested for alcohol over the summer break, and only a couple were found to be over the limit. However it needs to be reiterated, drink driving won't be tolerated and isn't necessary. We're a friendly bunch around here - ask for a ride. Do expect more testing and to be targeted.

There was only one significant crash, which occurred on the 31st of December on North Street, Mokau, in which a vehicle has crossed the centre line and collided head-on with another vehicle. One of the drivers is currently before the courts.

In recent months I have received a number of complaints regarding driver behaviour on the main street of Mokau, with the main street getting used more and more as a passing opportunity and a launch pad for the approaching 100 km/h sign. It appears that no amount of enforcement is going to fix the issue anytime soon, and I am in discussion with NZTA and contractors. Hopefully in time there will be some changes to the Main Street. However, I ask that if you have specific safety concerns that you either write me a letter or email outlining your concerns, experiences and any ideas that you might have and these will be helpful in my efforts to bring about some changes.

On 4th April there is a joint training for Fire, St Johns and Police, to refine our skills and build on our close working relationship. On the 16th – 17th of February our local SAR volunteers are participating in a training locally which is being hosted by Taranaki LandSAR.

Some other things I am working on is a live webcam feed for the sea and Mokau bar – this has obvious benefits for boat users, surfers and Search and Rescue. The marine repeater is still a project in progress, although slow, it will hopefully be improved prior to next summer. Finally, Waitomo Council are still in the process of working on a speed limit change for Te Mahoe Road and Fraser Smith Road.
