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\$2m rock project is complete

THE \$2.5 million project to make safe a section of the Mangaotaki Bluffs on SH3 after a woman was killed by a falling rock is finished almost a year to the date..

Heather Thompson (74) of New Plymouth died in March, 2014 when boulders crushed the car she was travelling in, south of Piopio. (*Waitomo News*, April 1 2014)

Her sister, who was driving, escaped with minor injuries.

At the time New Zealand Transport Agency's (NZTA) regional performance manager Karen Boyt said she was confident contractors had done all they could to prevent the deadly rock fall.

Monthly inspections of the bluffs'

rock face are carried out during periods of stormy weather and high rainfall, while high-risk areas are also re-inspected after heavy rain.

STEEL NET

In September, NZTA began work placing a 1600sq m steel net over a section of the bluffs above SH3 where Mrs Thompson was killed.

While clearing loose material and securing the steel mesh to the cliff face using 500 rock anchors, a section of road was reduced to one lane.

Part of the project involved planting native seeds and grass on the lower cliff face with hydro-soil equipment to further stabilise the site.

Ms Boyt says the rock anchors and steel net is a long-term solution to stabilising the area.

"The safety of motorists on this stretch of road is of the utmost importance to the transport agency," she says.

"We continually assess our highway network to identify and mitigate safety risks, and we adhere to internationally recognised rock fall safety guidelines."

MONITORING TO CONTINUE

Ms Boyt says NZTA will continue to monitor other sections of SH3 for potential rock fall risks.

"However, the nature of New Zealand's challenging geography means that the risks of rock falls and other natural events can never be completely eliminated."

Further plans include working with geotechnical experts to map high risk areas from south of Te Kuiti to Mokau.

"This assessment will essentially map key problem areas so we can identify any further need for stabilisation or protection work and ensure we are increasingly aware of changes," says Ms Boyt.

The road has now been reopened to two lanes.

FEEDBACK WANTED

Motorists travelling between the Awakino Gorge and Mt Messenger on SH3 are being encouraged to share their opinions of the route.

NZTA is investigating ways to increase safety and efficiency in the area as part of the Government's \$212 million Accelerated Regional Roading Package

This section of SH3, which is the main route between New Plymouth and Hamilton, travels through rough terrain, is windy and narrow and prone to rock falls and slips.

NZTA Waikato highways manager Kaye Clark says the investigation will focus on improving safety, freight efficiency and the resilience of the

The possibility of increasing the number of passing opportunities will also be looked at.

An online feedback form allows people to have their say on what is important to them.

"We want to hear from the public as we start to identify the challenges and possible improvements along this stretch of highway," says Ms Clark.

"We are encouraging people to tell us how they use this corridor, their thoughts on key areas and how we could consider improving it."

"The specific projects and work to be undertaken will depend on our investigation's findings.

"Feedback received from the community will help develop the potential safety and efficiently improvements."
