For many, two local businesses have become iconic to the district and the closure of Jeff Andrews Home kill and the sale of Progress Transport Ltd will see these businessmen change direction after years of dedication not only to their business but to the community.



In the earlier days Andrews butchery was a thriving business, established by Jeff And rews grandfather in 1904 where it operated



from Moa Street before it was run by his father and uncle until 1970. Jeff then brought the family business and it was only in recent years in 2006 where he relocated the business to Mangoataki Road. Since Jeff has serviced both locals and the wider community with onsite killing and home kill meat processing.

In a small community its hard to distinguish business from friendship, so the decision to close didn't come easy for Jeff.

But "after 44 years, I was the last in the family who had an interest in butchering, so the decision to finish was made but not without the fond memories of friendships made along the way".

Whilst Jeff and wife Shirley will remain in the district, they both look forward to opportunities the future may bring.

It is with great pleasure and pride that I share with you Curious Keas first ever ERO (Education Review Office) report. ERO came to Curious Keas in November, the experiences of staff meant that we were well prepared, and as it turns out ERO described the centre just how we (the staff) feel about it.

As an overview: We are in a great position for the length of time that we have been open. Our strengths of relationships with the children, whanau and community were acknowledged as well as the environment we have created along with a strong team atmosphere. We have been categorised to "well placed' which sees us on the three year cycle of review.

Some exerts from the report:

'Children experience affirming and supportive relationships with each other and centre staff. Their integrated and this social, emotional and physical needs are well met by responsive and caring staff. Familiar routines are centred around shared mealtimes and promote children's social competence supportive relationships as

and confidence. Children are happy, settled and show trust in approaching adults for help or advice'.

'The extensive outside play environments include many natural features and allow children to engage in physical challenge. From time to time the centre has young animals on site which children can interact with and care for. The inside play areas are well resourced. The flexible programme allows children to play independently with or alongside peers for extended periods of time, and to make meaningful choices about activities to participate in. Children have opportunities to develop early literacy and mathematical skills, and to engage in creative and imaginative play. The local and parent community is used effectively as an additional programme resource for visits and excursions'.

'Infants and toddlers are well supported by primary care givers.....Many centre activities are naturally promotes easy and relaxed transitions from the under two to the over two year old sections of the centre. Children and their parents are well informed through

they transition to the local primary schools'.

'Maori children and their whanau are affirmed through the inclusive culture and supportive relationships throughout the centre. Karakia and waiata are included in daily routines as appropriate'....

'Teachers work as a highly collaborative team. They meet formally to share information about children's interests and strengths, and to plan activities to respond. Teachers have made a positive start in presenting well-illustrated individual portfolios for allocated children....'

'The owner/centre manager provides considerable enthusiasm, energy, and extensive local networks for the service. She articulates a positive sense of direction and purpose for the centre and her staff. Parents who spoke to ERO expressed confidence in centre leadership and staff, and felt that communication with them was open and effective'.

Along with all of these affirming and warming comments comes (as always) areas to strengthen and improve. What was nice about this area is that there were no surprises for us, all of the

things that they suggested were things that we have discussed as future goals. These include a revisit and clarifying of our philosophy to develop in-depth understanding and shared ownership by staff and parents, and informed strategic decision making about staff and centre development, and resourcing, these things have helped me begin to form a strategic plan for the next 3-5 years.

It has been an amazing two years for Curious Keas, I am so proud to be the face of. We feel very lucky and privileged to be caring for your children and be a part of their Early Learning. Cheers to another great vear...

for our farming community are looking a little bit brighter, though the constant predictions of impending interest rate rises will be taking the shine off for some.

is heading for a shake up with announcements of amalgamation investigations established within the for Northland and Hawkes Bay already. In the Waikato, it is felt the Auckland 'Super City' scenario for amalgamation will not be appropriate, especially for smaller rural local authorities, so consequently the Waikato Mayoral Forum was established. The aim of this is to investigate how the local authorities in the Waikato can work together, in specific areas of service, to provide those services much

more efficiently and cost effectively. Mayor Brian now underway and prospects Hanna and CEO Chris Ryan have both had large inputs into the project so far, and Brian has recently been elected Deputy Chair for the Forum, as well as being on the Roading Working Party, one of the four work streams The Local Government scene (others being; Economic Development, Planning and Governance, and Waters) Mayoral Forum. Mayor Brian has also been appointed to one of eight Community Seats on the **Collaborative Stakeholder** Group for the Healthy Rivers; Plan for Change project. This project will work with stakeholders to develop changes to the Waikato Regional Councils regional plan, to help restore and protect the health of the Waikato and Waipa Rivers. The plan change will help,

over time, to reduce sediment, bacteria, and nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) entering water bodies (including groundwater) in the Waikato and Waipa River Catchments. I can see these likely plan changes being extended to other Catchments in the Waikato region in time, including the Mokau and the Awakino.

The Mokauiti Catchment Control Scheme of the 1980's failed for a number of reasons, but a substantial data base was established, and by tweaking with todays science and technology, it should still be applicable to day. For those of you in the valley who might like to give some thought toward being proactive about meeting the water quality challenges that will eventuate from the Healthy Rivers project,
