The riders are all members of the Patriots Motorcycle Club, Te Ahi Kikoha and The Redeemed.

Local riders will join them at Piopio at 8.55am, travelling down Rora St at 9.15 to the Te Kuiti Domain where an event has been organised by the Maniapoto Family Violence Intervention Network (MFVIN).

The riders will be greeted by hundreds of school children performing a mass powhiri and some of the men will share their stories and anti-violence messages.

The White Ribbon riders will be asking North King Country men to sign the campaign's pledge to never commit, condone or remain silent about violence towards women.


After a games demonstration by the children, the riders will be treated to a hangi with a sausage sizzle for whanau and supporters.
