# A night for our Knights

IT was a night of North King Country knights at the annual Brian Perry Waikato Regional Sports Awards in Hamilton on Thursday.

At the region's biggest sporting celebration of the year, it was Te Kuiti's two greatest sporting icons Sir Colin Meads and Sir David Fagan that stole the spotlight.

Amid a glittering line up of the district's sporting elite including Olympic and Commonwealth Games athletes and several New Zealand representatives, Sir Colin and Sir David were honoured with special awards for their contribution to the Waikato sporting landscape.

Sport Waikato chief executive Matthew Cooper said Sir David's special award was in recognition of his services to shearing sports and to acknowledge "a great Waikato sporting icon".

"Sir David's accomplishments include 642 open championships, five individual world championships, seven world team championships and he was the first shearer to shear 810 lambs and 702 ewes in a nine hour working day under World Record rules," said Cooper.

"He has represented New Zealand more than 120 times in various teams and retired from competitive shearing in April 2015 whilst ranked number one in New Zealand.

"And after all this success, Sir David has always remained consistent with his humility, his respect for his family and friends, his willingness to help others backed by one of the most positive attitude to life you'll ever see.

"For the most outstanding contribution to his sport, the Waikato region acknowledges Sir David Fagan."

"Tonight's sporting leader is considered one of the greatest players in their chosen sport," he said.

"This person draws people to events, many of which have helped raise hundreds of thousands of dollars for a variety of organisations.

"Our recipient is considered to be one of the greatest players in history and is an icon within New Zealand rugby."

Cooper added that Sir Colin is a member of both the international Rugby Hall of Fame and the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame and was named the country's Player of the Century at the NZRFU Awards in 1999.

"In 2009, he was presented with the honour of Knight Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit, but more often he goes by the name of 'Pinetree' or simply 'Tree'," said Cooper.

"Ladies and gentlemen, I'm delighted to announce that the Waikato sport fraternity acknowledges and salutes the outstanding contribution of Sir Colin Meads as this year's 2015 Hare Puke Leadership in Sport recipient."

Sir Colin says receiving the award was a huge surprise.

"I was in shock there for a while," he says.

"I was up there, I thought, to do a presentation to David. However, there was one for me also

"It was a very special one and it took me completely by surprise.

"They said it was for outstanding contribution to sport which I guess is spaced over a hell of a lot of years.

"But aside from that, it was a great honour and I was very humbled by it all."

Adding to a long list of accolades for Sir Colin, he says the Hare Puke Award rates up there with them all.

"It just means that Te Kuiti and the Waitomo district are getting recognised for their achievements. So it was a huge night not only for me and David, but for the entire district as well."

Shifting the spotlight, Sir Colin says he was "very proud" to be a part of Sir David's presentation.

"It was good to see David recognised for all his great shearing feats over the years."

Sir Colin was supported at the event by his wife Verna, daughter Shelley Mitchell and grandaughter Christy.

Cooper says both knights were humble in receiving their awards and received standing ovations from the 500-strong crowd.
