## What a Difference a Road Makes

This week the tiny coastal settlement of Mokau has been isolated when the main arterial route to New Plymouth was closed by a slip.

Slips are nothing new to the residents of Mokau as they happen all the time in the Awakino Gorge just north of the township. These slips are normally cleared quickly and life goes on but the slip to the south has resulted in the road being closed for several days.

Mrs Scott the Principal of Mokau School was caught on the other side of the slip having been to town to get her groceries. While in town she and her husband heard about the slip from her daughter who had seen a post on facebook.

Despite a large flashing sign at Brixton saying 'SHW 3 - road to Mokau closed' they thought the slip would be cleared by late afternoon so they stopped for coffee in Urenui before heading along the coastal road.

Cars were heading in their direction which they naively thought was a good indication that the road was open but little did they know that all these people had been turned around at the road block!

Patiently they joined the queue of cars waiting by Mohakatino Station - cars were still periodically coming in the other direction! A good sign? No!

Finally a car driver winds down their window and drives s-l-o-w-l-y p-a-s-t and tells the queue - the road will be closed for days, turn around! Oh No!!

Long story short Mrs Scott and her husband had a muddy return to Mokau and their car and groceries were left on the other side of the slip!

Life in Mokau was different this week. Kids did not get to school, people could not get to town. Mokau was very quiet with no trucks passing through.

Some people resorted to travelling the long way round to New Plymouth taking the gravel road to Ohura. Others were just content to watch the helicopter and the monsoon bucket dislodging rubble from the cliff face, a long slow progress.

Some children rejoiced that they had a few days off school, parents lamented that they were missing work and life went on - only differently.



On Sunday the 18<sup>th</sup> of September there was a slip in Mokau by the Tainui Camping Ground.

In the little village cars parked up on the side of the road. Big trucks taking up space cramped between each other.

A couple of days after that a helicopter flew over the slip and poured water on it so the rest of the slip could come down.

My friend Connell, Claude and Claude's sister named Francis plus their little brother named Emmet were on the other side of the slip.
