
# The 100 year old Tennis Club

1921 was a big year around the globe. Mongolia declares independence from China, Germany announces that it will be unable to meet its Great War reparation payments and British coal miners go on strike leading to 'Black Friday'. Other events include Sweden abolishing capital punishment, Perfume Chanel No. 5 being released by fashion designer Coco Chanel and Prince Phillip is born (although the title of Prince comes later). On the sporting front, Charles Paddock runs a world record 100m in a time of 10.4 seconds, Babe Ruth achieves 139 home runs taking over from Roger Connor as the all time home run leader for Major League Baseball and Bill Tilden beats South African Brian Norton 4-6, 2-6, 6-1, 6-0, 7-5 to win the Wimbledon Men's Tennis singles title (this is the 3<sup>rd</sup> of his 10 Grand Slam singles titles).

Closer to home, the Otago Central Railway between Dunedin and Cromwell was completed, the New Zealand Division of the Royal Navy was established and weekly flag saluting ceremonies were made compulsory in public schools. Recession hits as a post-war economic boom came to a shuddering halt with the end of Britian's wartime commandeer of New Zealand farm exports. The mastermind of the 'Think Big' projects, Robert Muldoon, is born. He famously said "New Zealanders who leave for Australia raise the IQ's of both countries". It would be interesting to hear what he would have to say about Australia's current immigration policy!

Back in Piopio, and 3 years before the first motorised school buses arrived, our own big thinkers thought that there should be a tennis club established. So in typical rural fashion a dedicated bunch of community minded people got together and like that, the Piopio Lawn Tennis Club was born.

It's now 100 years later and we would like you to help us celebrate this magnificent achievement. Whether you have been a member of the club, a member of our community or have just driven past, we would be stoked if you came along to this festive day. So join us on the 10<sup>th</sup> April 2021 to play your part in celebrating this milestone.



acknowledge the work that Kristen has done for the past two terms as Chairperson.



# KCRC MARCH UPDATE



I hope your grass is growing and the next rain is not as far away as the forecast suggests. As the days get shorter and the weather cools KCRC is looking to give you the opportunity to get together to discuss what events we want for the next 12 months, to make some progress with your Farm Environment plan and to access some funding from 1BT via us for fencing & planting projects on farm. KCRC are looking to catch up with sub-catchment group farmers next month. We will have results of our river/stream testing, we'll be looking to discuss further the workshops we have planned (see below) and accessing our 1BT funding. We also need feedback on what other experts/workshops/events you would like us to organise and what 'community wellbeing' projects your group would like to invest in.

\* Fencing & Planting funding -Together with 1Billion Trees, KCRC is providing a "Kick Start" for on farm fencing and planting to farmers who have a recent, relevant Farm Plan (FEP) and are involved with their local KCRC subcatchment group. This agreement is for \$1.9 million over the next 3 years. The Application form is available now - this is an opportunity for KCRC farmers to invest in getting work done on your farm – you choose what, where and how you spend this planting and fencing funding. Get involved in your local catchment group to find

If you are planning to access this funding for planting this year it is essential to get your plants/trees ordered from your preferred nursery asap, if you can't find plants let me know and we'll see if we can help. \* Farm Planning Workshops will continue to be delivered together with B+LNZ who are cofunding them. Initially we have 4 'Refresher' workshops for those who have got their FEP underway. More opportunities will follow. In April the new Beef+LambNZ

which will be useful for those yet to get their FEP underway. Regretfully there is still no digital option, but we believe getting started and gathering the necessary info into one place will make Farm Planning in the future significantly easier (and probably cheaper). We will need people to book to ensure we have enough lunch/resources.

Refresher workshops again 14th and 15th April at venues to be confirmed.

Intro to Farm Planning B+LNZ workshops: 22nd and 29th April

\* Drop-in sessions -

Anna & Jo are hosting sessions for farmers looking for help with developing their Farm Plans after attending a workshop; and getting their plans/applications sorted to access our Fencing & Planting Kick Start funding.

These will be Tuesdays 3-5pm, initially at the Night Owl in Piopio however extra venues can be added if there is demand.

\* Nutrient Budgeting workshops OverseerFM is a tool that enables farmers to optimise their farm systems within certain environmental constraints. KCRC have engaged PerrinAg to deliver a series of workshops to firstly familiarise interested farmers with Overseer and Nutrient budgeting

those who would like to subscribe and develop their own Overseer Nutrient budget (Develop your NB). This course will provide the opportunity for independent discussion about the use of Overseer, instruct and assist farmers in how to set up their farm operations in Overseer, and better equip them to create and interpret this section of their Farm Environment Plan for their own farming business. Registration is essential. Venue likely to be Piopio for all depending on where attendees

Intro to NB: 12 or 13 April (choose one)

Develop your NB: 29 April & 13 May (ideally attend Intro to NB then both these sessions).

# **Councillor's Update**

At an Extraordinary Council Meeting on Friday 12 March, we adopted for Audit, the Supporting Information, and Draft Consultation Document, for the 2021-2031 Ten Year Plan..

The Auditors Opinion (their report on the review) will then be used to do a 'hot review' for any necessary changes, and at another Extraordinary Council Meeting on Friday 16 April we will adopt the Supporting Information and Consultation Document for public consultation. The consultation period will run from 21 April to 21 May, during which time any written submissions must be lodged with Council.

Then 27 & 28 May have been set aside for you to talk to your submission, if you wish, to Elected Members.

On 9 June we will hold 'Deliberations' when we will consider and discuss your submissions and make any changes to the draft plan that we think necessary as a consequence.

The Ten Year Plan will then be adopted by Council at the Council Meeting on 29 June 2021.

The process, which started in July 2020, to formulate the Plan, has been complicated by COVID and the consequent Government job protection/generation policies, Government policy proposals for Freshwater, The Three Waters (Drinking Water, Waste Water, and Storm water), Carbon Zero, and Resource Management Act reform.

The Three Waters policy will have a huge impact on all Councils, and possibly within two years, but as there are no details finalised as yet, Councils have been instructed to complete their Ten Year Plans as if there will be no change to the current system. If Government achieves its time schedules we may need to repeat this whole Plan process again within two years.

I, and other Councillors and staff will be attending a day- long seminar in Rotorua on 26 March, run by the Three Waters Steering Group, chaired by Brian Hanna, where hopefully we will learn more about the transition of Council owned and



operated (and funded) Three Waters assets, to an unknown number of large scale entities that will then own, operate, and fund those assets. Hopefully I'll have more details for you in the next Birdtalk.

The Consultation Document (20 plus pages) includes a submission form and lists crucial timelines that will need to be met. A Consultation meeting has been arranged by Federated Farmers for the Piopio-Aria Golf Clubrooms at 7.00pm on Wednesday 5 May, so hope to see you there.

statistics of bank-note circulation, the value of bank-notes in circulation during Easter week being £7,852,719, an increase of 11 per cent. over the corresponding average for 1935—itself a relatively large figure. It is worthy of mention that the note circulation in the Christmas week of 1935 was also considerably higher than at the previous Christmas previous Christmas.

# THE EASTER TRAFFIC. THE WAITOMO CAVES.

### A RECORD ESTABLISHED

INADEQUATE ACCOMMODATION

To the Easter holiday seeker the Waitomo Caves have ever been a popular resort. This has been well and truly demonstrated during the past week.

The accommodation at the Hostel was more than over-laxed for the

and truly demonstrated during the past week.

The accommodation at the Hostel was more than over-taxed for the week-end of Easter. Bookings had been closed over six weeks prior to Eastertide, consequently the Te Kuitind Otorohanga hotels and boardinghouses were soon refusing guests, while a private house at Waitomo had 25 tourists. Even the contractors engaged in the erection of the new staff quarters at the Hostel were making shake-downs in their camp for the sightscers. It has also to be remembered that there was a great crowd of campers on the Waitomo River flat.

The motor traffic has never been so heavy to the Caves as over the weekend. Fifty-five cars, besides the service cars and buses, were parked at the Ruakuri and Aranai Caves on Easter Saturday morning, while on Easter Saturday morning, while on Easter Sunday the number was 67.

During Easter, 1925, 100 visitors visited the three Caves on Good Friday, 220 on Easter Saturday, and on Easter Sunday 360. This constituted a record, which has now, howeverbeen surpassed. The past week-end saw 180 visitors to the Caves on Good Friday, 400 on Easter Saturday, and 350 on the Sunday. A total of 170 tourists lunched at the Hostel on Easter Sunday, as against 100 on the Sunday of last year.

The electric lighting in the Caves proved a boon both to parties and to guides. On Easter Sunday there were 140 people in the Ruakuri Caves at one time; 160 were in Aranui at once, while a like number were handled in Waitomo. On Good Friday veening 130 people were put through the Waitomo Caves in an hour and a half. The electric light made this permissible, coupled, of course, with the excellent handling of the parties by the Caves authorities.

To those interested in the tourist traffic to Waitomo Caves there is a

the excellent handling of the parties by the Caves authorities. To those interested in the tourist traffic to Waitomo Caves there is a lesson to learn from the recent Easter season. The number of cars could never have been handled but for the parking areas which have ocen recently laid out. It goes without saying that the large number who visited the Caves could never have been handled so expeditiously but for the electric lighting. These improvements have already proved their previous necessity, and also that the advocates for better things at Waitomo have all along had a proper conception of the requirements necessary to cope with the traffic offering during the season, which for Waitomo is practically the whole year round. The proposed additions to the Hostel should have been completed long ago. It is estimated that between 270 and 300 intending visitors made personal should have been completed ong ago. It is estimated that between 270 and 300 intending visitors made personal requests for Easter reservations at the Hostel, to be told that all the accommodation had been fully booked two months prior to Easter. And what is more, it is absolutely unfair, it is unjust for the Government to expect the management to cope with the traffic under existing conditions. Fancy having 170 guests to lunch, when the Hostel dining room accommodation is 50!

Too much money has already been lost by way of revenue, because of the indifferent attitude taken by the Public Works Department concerning the commencement of the new building, and it is time that the powers that be realise that in the Waitono Caves we have the country's greatest tourist asset and should appoint it accordingly.
