

TAINUI'S STONE ANCHOR - THE MAURI OF THE MOKAU

HISTORY OF A FAMOUS RELIC

The policy of assembling the hereditary treasures of the Maori in the Auckland Museum, in order to assess their permanent preservation, should have the support of all of us, pakeha and Maori, to take pride in the wonderful story of the ancient race. Dr Peter Buck, and Mr George Graham and their likeminded workers in this truly patriotic use, deserve every sympathy and assistance. Happily Auckland is blessed over all other parts of New Zealand with a strong sense of public and private responsibility in such matters. Auckland then with the means to help are never found wanting.

Would that such generosity were more widely diffused in New Zealand. It is however, with a certain little lingering regret that I read of my friend Peter Buck's success in inducing the Kaumatua of the Mokau Heads to consent to the removal of the stone anchor of the Tainui canoe to the Auckland Museum. Te Rangihiroa sure has a wonderful way with him! There was an Irish musician once, they say, who fiddled so grandly that he could charm the very birds out of the trees. We may expect to hear of all kinds of hereditary treasures being charmed into the museum. But I ask Te Rangihiroa, what are the Mokau people going to do for their fish supply, if the Punga-o-Tainui is lifted from its ancient abiding place?

LUCK AND "MANA"

Let us elucidate. For centuries the stone anchor of Tainui has been the "mauri" of the Mokau Heads fisheries. "Mauri" here may be translated as "luck stone", but it is more than that. It is the tangible embodiment of "mana the accretion of generation upon generation of tribal veneration and tradition, that token and symbol of the "old hereditary grand canoe." Long ago it became associated in Ngati Maniapoto belief and practice, with the presence of the fish in the tidal river and at the heads, and to a presence there was attributed to the great plenty of food of this kind for which the Mokau was celebrated among the tribes. It was a tribal shrine; songs and prayers centred about it; it was the centre of curious saga and legend dating back well nigh a hundred years.

It was 25 years ago, or thereabouts, that old Taniora Wharauroa, a tattooed warrior of the ancient Tainui stock took me to see the mauri of the fisheries, and told its legend and chanted the famous hauling song of Hotrua's canoe. He lamented the deaths of the olden chiefs, the great rata trees of the tribe. "I" he said "am the last here. I am but as the weeds in yonder garden." The patriarchial Rangituataka, of Mahoenui, was Taniora's superior in rank, but he lived inland; the grim old fighter Te Oro, who lived near the Kawau Rock, a few miles south of the Mokau, and Taniora were the last of those who kept a reverential eye on the "mauri" of the fisheries.

The anchor stone is a smoothly worn boulder of sandstone, in shape something like an hour-glass, but with one end larger than the other; it is about four feet in length. About its middle the anchorline of the Tainui was made fast in the long ago when Hoturoa sailed this long outrigger canoe here, and it landed to explore the land. Tainui later went on to Kawhia and there in the sacred cove at Maketu beach you may see to-day the two white stones that indicate the resting-place.

The canoe was moored bow and stern, one line was made

fast to this "punga" the other to a curious rock called Tokopapa, a tiny island shaped something like a mushroom, or again say, a ship's capstan of the old fashioned type; it stands there to-day near Tainui store; the attrition of centuries has much reduced its size. The hour-glass stone lies on the sand, on the north or proper right bank of the Mokau, about half a mile below the punt ferry. It is covered by the tide at high-water.

FOR THE GODS OF THE FISHERIES

Beyond Tainui, seaward, is the sandhill Te Naunau. A very tapu place. Here up to modern times, Maori fishermen used to deposit the first mullet or kahawai caught on a fishing expedition, as an offering to the gods of the fisheries.

About 40 years ago a coastwise trader ran a cutter between Waitara and Mokau Heads. This white man became very friendly with the Maori here, but he presumed rather too much on his friendship, when on one of his cruises he hauled the Tainui anchor-stone on board his cutter and sailed away with it to Waitara. What he intended doing with it there, is uncertain, but the story is that he proposed to sell it to the museum.

Immediately the luck-stone of the Tainui was taken away the fish all deserted the rivers and the heads. Canoes went out as usual, the long seine nets were drawn on the beaches, hook and line were lowered for shark. Aue, aue. Not a fish was to be caught; the mullet, the kahawai, the shark; flounder that were once speared on the sand flats by torchlight – all disappeared. Even the pipi shellfish migrated – not a pipi could the wahine find, dug the never so industriously.

There was much trouble in the Mokau households. What was to be done about it? Clearly the Punga-o-Tainui must be returned.

So the chiefs of Mokau raised a loud complaint to the Government, or the police at Waitara or to some other potent authority, and the pakeha who had taken it away was compelled to return it to its old home.

And if any further proof were needed of the high mana inherent in the "mauri" stone here it was supplied. The fish all returned to their accustomed haunts: the shoals indeed were more plentiful than ever; and Mokau revelled in the treasures of Tangtaroa. Long lines of drying shark delicately scented the Mokau air; there were kahawai and schnapper and mullet by the canoe-load and pipi by the ton. The great nets were drawn again and again and scores of hands were needed to haul them in. Never were Ngati-Maniapoto so generously fed by Tangaroa; never was the "Kupenga-o-Taramainuku" more abundantly filled.

So there lies Tainui's most potent punga to-day, guarding as of old the food supplies, a visible link with the wonderful days of the past. The old order is passing; pakeha vandals are about; Tainui may easily be smashed up by some of those destructive two-legged animals of whom we hear too often.

The only safe place is the museum.

But just one question, oh friend, Te Rangihiroa.

What are you going to do about those fisheries when the mauri of the Mokau has gone?

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE MUSEUM

There has been lots happening at the Museum. Displays are being progressively updated as each item is entered into the national database recording not only the artefact but also the story behind them.

Other good news. The museum has recently been granted a significant funding boost and many thanks goes out to the main sponsors, including Lotteries Commission, TSB Community Trust, Waitomo District Council and Firstgas, who without the support of these organisations the museum would not be able to function as it does. But having funding is only part of the picture and we are continually grateful to the faithful volunteers who are part of your museum life every day.

The new committee has hit the ground running and with the diverse range of experience and skills from the local community, Ngati Tama and Ngati Maniapoto expect to see changes within the collection and with how we connect and share your heritage within the community.

Lots to do, means lots of help required, and a Volunteers & Community sub-committee has been established with the specific task of connecting the museum to the community. Headed by Janice Moynihan, if you are looking to how you can get involved please make contact. Be it as a general handyman, a special interest project, or just a friendly face, there is a place for you here as we continue to build this wonderful community asset bequeathed to us for your children to connect with.
