# Waitomo Citizenship of The Year Award

was a surprise to Piopio resident Sheryl Johnson. Nominated by the Piopio community swimming pools charitable trust committee, Rob Hallam -Chairman and Lynne Rauputu - Treasurer, commended Sheryl on her tireless efforts; having instigated the formation of the trust and her vision to retain this valuable community asset.

Hearing of the possible closure and rising operational costs of the local school pool, Sheryl's' concerns of high drowning amongst children and the need for every child to have the opportunity to learn to swim, was held in mind throughout the project. To pursue the viability of retaining the pools within the community, a standalone trust was formed.

Whilst the pool is located on Ministry of Education land, the asset has now been placed into the hands of the Piopio community swimming pools charitable trust. With ever increasing operation costs and shortage of funding, the certainty of the pools future is heading in the right direction; however some legality are still in the hands of Ministry of Education. Local National MP Barabara Kuriger was on hand at the recent award service and has offered her support to back the group. Several key stakeholders in the community have also offered support and the group are grateful.

Hosted at the Les Munroe centre in Te Kuiti, Mayor Brian Hanna and MC Max Lamb commented on how each individual has improved and enriched our wider community. Among the recipients for Lifetime Achievements; Sarah Ashby, Edith McIndoe and Graeme Plenderleith all had compelling

achievements throughout the wider district. Similar stories were shared of the passion, energy and selflessness each nominee contributed to their own cause. Pastor Terry Bradley boldly stated "Their success is your success, by the community that

surrounds". In these words each recipient attributed their "award to those who supported them and their doing was not to be thanked but because they believed it needed to be done".

Such a true statement and one applauded by everyone in attendance.

For the Piopio district, we are fortunate to have residents whom believe in the community and what it has to offer.

Future plans hope to be known shortly, meanwhile the trust group will continue to aim for the longevity of the pools to be retained as a recreational asset for both schools, sports clubs and public swimming.

# THURSDAY EXERCISES:

We are using DVD's which allow you to sit or stand to either collection or disposal. To reduce contamination and improve recycling efficiency, wash and squash!

# WASH

1.Scrape out any food remains/pour away excess liquid.

2. Rinse the container conservatively (use your sink & washing-up water).

# SQUASH

1.Crush metal cans.

2.Squeeze plastic bottles flat to expel as much air as possible.

These steps help prevent contamination and makes collection and disposal more efficient.

Removing the caps and lids from plastic containers is important. Plastic caps are often made from a different polymer type, and therefore are not accepted as part of the recycling service. Too many lids will contaminate the load, so remove and throw away plastic caps where possible or re-use for another purpose (school/ preschool's use these for crafts etc).

# **USE OF THE PIOPIO** TRANSFER STATION

All people who use the Piopio transfer station must ensure that:

- All waste is separated into the recyclable refuse and residual waste categories. These are all marked with signage for easy identification.
- All waste is off-loaded at the place and in the manner directed by the site operator.
- All steps are taken to assist in the minimisation of waste.
- All reasonable steps are taken to protect the health and safety of all of those persons on site including site staff.
- Leaving rubbish outside the Piopio Transfer Station is an offence under the Litter Act 1979. This offence may lead to a fine upon conviction of up to \$5,000.

# PIOPIO AMATEUR SWIMMING

CLUBS successful season began with A great success and the calibre of our early pre-season training for Club Squad members back in October 2015. We thank the support of the Waitomo District Council grants scheme in assisting with hire costs at the Te Kuiti Community Pools.

Locally our newly revived Piopio Community Trust pools, opened for our 2016 season in February, with 65 Primary School aged children enrolled in Learn to Swim, and 17 Club Squad Swimmers.

An intensive 12 lessons, impacts our Learn to swim children, seeing great advances in their abilities. A HUGE Thanks to our volunteer coaches, Bex Clapcott, Trudy Denize, Jo Alcock, Kate Carter and Sheryl Johnson. Erin Barclay and Grisial Ifin have also volunteered, working alongside these ladies to hopefully return next season and teach in our mentoring program. Thanks also to Janice Haine and Noelle Turner who have filled in when needed. Without your time, and dedication to our program, it just wouldn't be possible.

The annual Piopio Carnival was well supported with 48 swimmers from surrounding areas; Piopio, Te Kuiti, COUNCILLORS UPDATE

The Dog Control Fees for 2016/17 were recently confirmed by Council, and published in the Waitomo News on 5 May and 12 May. Each Fee has been increased by 5% over and above the 2015/16 fee.

The Council's Revenue and Financing Policy sets out how specific Council costs are to be recovered. In the case of Dog Control (which comes under Animal and Dog Control), it states that 80% of those costs should be funded from Dog Registration Fees, 10% from General Rates, and 10% from Uniform Annual General Charges (UAGC).

The expected cost of providing Animal and Dog Control Services in 2016/17 is \$259,000, and reflects the increase in level of service over the last two years. Even with the 5%

I have recently received a Ministry of Transport report 'Why do People Die in Road Crashes', which analysed 72 open road fatalities involving trucks and cars, and 30 urban fatalities involving trucks and cars. Based on Serious Crash Unit reports, and survival of other occupants who were wearing seat belts, the main conclusion was that 30% of fatalities are potentially avoidable if seat belts are worn.
