\$60k upgrade for popular local park

ONE of Waitomo district's most visited playgrounds is about to undergo a \$60,000 upgrade.

Waitomo District Council is replacing outdated playground equipment at Centennial Park in Te Kuiti with two major pieces of equipment ready for installation next month.

An audit completed by Park Central Consultants identified that the playground was past its "useful life" as the deck frames were badly rusted and it was not cost effective to repair.

Eleven playgrounds in the district were audited to rate their condition and measure how well WDC is complying with New Zealand Safety Standards.

Community services group manager John De Luca says after the audit, the council received an assessment of how well the playground equipment is being maintained and recommendations for

"The audit shows that almost all of the playgrounds are in very good condition, are being well maintained and the level of compliance of the playground safety is high. This is great feedback for our parks and facilities team here.

"The playground at Centennial Park is one of the most visited and used playgrounds in the district, especially during weekend sports events and training evenings."

WDC allocated funding in its capital budget for the 2011/12, 2012/13 and 2013/14 financial years to allow for the purchase and installation of the new playground equipment at a cost of \$61,615.

The budget was spread over three years to support the council's affordability principle set out in the Long Term Plan. Extra climbing equipment at Redwood Park has also been approved.
