Youth plan given a ministerial nod

TE KUITI'S ground-breaking Youth Ac- back its own social responsibilities by lettion Plan has received national recognition from Social Development Minister Paula Bennett.

Not only has Ms Bennett pledged continued support for the social sector trial, she heaped praise on its governance group saying: "Te Kuiti's youth is in good hands".

The minister, also responsible for Youth Affairs and Employment, visited Te Kuiti on Tuesday to discuss social issues with representatives from local groups including Te Kuiti Hospital, Wintec, Police, Waitomo District Council and youth services.

The breakfast at Panorama Motor Inn gave Ms Bennett an opportunity to outline the Government's future plans around social sector trials and in particular Te Kuiti's Youth Action Plan.

"I can tell you there will not be a 'Paula Bennett' programme rolled out around the nation," she said.

"What you will see is more autonomy for each area in how they manage their own resources and their own abilities to know what works best because the answers to our challenges and problems on the ground lie within the communities themselves."

She said the Government is not scaling

ting communities take control instead action plan results have been so positive, plans are underway to expand social sector trials in more towns around the country.

In 2011, Te Kuiti, Kawerau, Tokoroa, Taumarunui, Levin and Gore were selected to trial a new approach to social service delivery called 'action plans' which are designed and governed by local people.

"After seeing the success of Te Kuiti's social sector trials, I can honestly say the youth here are in very good hands," said Ms Bennett.

"Te Kuiti people have a great can-do attitude and it shows in the action plan's results which as minister for social development and youth affairs is heartening to see."

Since its launch in October 2011, the Te Kuiti Youth Action Plan has resulted in decreased truancy and youth offending and increased youth employment.

Te Kuiti Social Sector youth services manager Hilary Karaitiana spoke at the breakfast on behalf of the governance group.

"In our community we do have the skills and knowledge to be able to make positive decisions provided the mandated support we get from Wellington is there.
